

Fall Board Meeting

September 6, 1984

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Charlottesville, VA

The fall meeting of the Board of Directors of VFMC was called to order by the President, Mrs. Edward Gloyd, at 9:10 AM, September 6, 1984, at Mount Vernon Motor Lodge, Charlottesville, Va. There were twenty-nine Board members present and twelve Senior Club presidents.

Invocation was given by the Chaplain, Mrs. John Bankos.

Mrs. Patrick Healey, Corresponding Secretary, read excuses from seventeen absent Board members.

A Memorial Tribute was read by the Chaplain, Mrs. Bankos, to the memory of two loyal members of V.F.M.C.: Mrs. Henry Albertson and Mrs. Frances Rogers Coates. The written Tribute is filed with these Minutes.

Minutes of the May 2nd Board Meeting were read and approved as read.

The recommendations from the Executive Board were read by the Secretary who moved the adoption of the following:

1. Funds for expenses of the National Board Member be raised \$200 to bring the total to \$500. Adopted.

2. Registration for the Convention of 1985 be \$6.00; for one day the fee to be \$2.00. Adopted.

3. Local Festivals may charge additional fees as necessary. Adopted.

4. That the V.F.M.C. extend Senior Special Memberships to Mr. Frederic Boots and to Mr. Edward Gloyd. Approved.

Nominations for National Board Member were called for and Mrs. James W. Milne, Sr., was nominated by Mrs. Fred Boots. This nomination was seconded and Mrs. Milne was unanimously elected.

Mrs. Milne then nominated Mrs. Arthur E. Reynolds as National Board Member at Large. This nomination was seconded and Mrs. Reynolds was elected.


Mrs. Gloyd said that nominations were in order for two members to serve on the State Nominating Committee. Mrs. Schiffner nominated Mrs. John Bankos and Mrs. Milne nominated Mrs. Chiles Cridlin. These members were duly elected to serve along with the District representatives as follows: District I, Carolyn Noble; District II, Linda Beville; District III, Hester Sadler; District IV, Virginia Schricker. Mrs. Bankos is to serve as the Chairman of this committee.

Pat Boots presented the cards which were designed by Virginia artists and others at no cost to us and are to be sold to VFMC members to raise funds for scholarships.

In the President's report, Mrs. Gloyd announced that N.F.M.C. accepted Virginia's invitation to host the N.F.M.C. Fall Session in August 1986. She also announced numerous awards given to V.F.M.C. and organizations which were presented at the N.F.M.C. Fall Session in August 1984.

Mrs. James Milne reported as National Board member; and reports were given by State officers who were present: Mrs. Benjamin Thompson, third vice-president; Mrs. Cridlin, Recording Secretary; Mrs. Robery Schiffner, Treasurer, reporting a balance June 30, 1984, of \$17,199.16; and Mrs. Milne, as Historian.

All levels will perform two memorized works of appropriate difficulty representing contrasting styles and periods. For the senior entrant the choice of any two repertoire suggestions from the following list would make an acceptable program. This list is submitted as a guide. Senior Repertoire List: 1. A Baroque or Early Classic Work 2. A Concerto Movement (not slow) 3. A Major Virtuoso piece 4. Two Short Pieces (Counting as one) of Contrasting Styles and Periods If #4 is chosen, it would be necessary to list three pieces on the application. Junior 6 minutes Playing Time: Intermediate 8 minutes Senior 12 minutes *Note: The teacher and student together are responsible for planning

the timing. The birth date of the chosen composers will determine where the selections will appear on the program. The performer is free to play his compositions in any order he chooses. The performer must know in advance which piece he is going to play first and at what place he plans to start the second piece. The copies of the music furnished the judges should indicate this information. If the Elementary entrant has not started his second piece at the end of 4 minutes playing time, the timer will give a signal to start the second piece. If the Intermediate entrant has not started his second piece at the end of 5 minutes playing time, the timer will give a signal to start the second piece. If the Senior entrant has not started his second piece at the end of 9 minutes playing time, the timer will give a signal to start the second piece.

ARLINGTON COUNTY

Zoning Laws - 558-2414. Teachers may teach a maximum of twelve students per day and a maximum of four students at a time. An Occupancy Permit is required, and is received from the zoning office. There is no charge for the Occupancy Permit, the teacher merely signs it and agrees to certain conditions, such as the number of students. Business License - 558-2511. A license is required, regardless of the income that the teacher earns. The minimum fee is \$25 and covers income up to \$6,250. Above that the fee is prorated on the teacher's earnings. If a teacher does not have a license, there is a penalty of tax due based on the gross receipts of the last three years. plus the present year.

Tangible Business Tax - 558-2076. There is a late penalty charged for taxes that should have been payed on personal property that is declared a deduction as such as pianos, music equipment, etc.

FAIRFAX COUNTY

Zoning Laws - 691-2381. Only people living in the home may work there, no outside employees. Teachers may teach a maximum of eight students per day and a maximum of four students at a time. A letter of approval (occupancy permit) must first be obtained from the zoning office (no charge) before the business license can be received. <u>Business License - 691-2511</u>. All teachers, regardless of income, need a license. When income is less than \$10,000 per year, there is no charge for the license. The license fee for income over \$10,000 is figured on the gross receipts at 22¢ per \$100. If a teacher has not had a license, there is no penalty if the income has been less than \$10,000 for the last four years. If the income has exceeded that amount, the penalty is a percentage of gross receipts plus interest for the last three years plus the current year. A penalty for back personnal property taxes is: also applied.

FAIRFAX CITY

Zoning Laws - 385-7820. There can only be one student at a time, there can be no extra effect on the neighborhood traffic or parking, there can be no external signs, there can be no emplyees from outside of the home, and there can be no equipmint not found in homes. <u>Business License - 385-7880</u>. When annual income is below \$1800, no license is required. For annual income of \$1800 - \$16,667 a license fee of \$30 is required. For income above \$16,667 the fee is adjusted according to income. An occupancy permit is needed before the business license can be obtained. The occupancy permit is a one time, \$5 fee and the number to call is 385-7820 (zoning office). There is a penalty for not having a business license, based on gross receipts of the last three years plus the present year. There is also a penalty on any property taxes due on any furniture used as a business deduction.

CITY OF ALEXANDRIA

Zoning Laws - 838-4688. There is no limit to the number of students that can be taught in one day or the number of students that can be taught at one time. Judgement will be made if it is felt that the studio has become more like a school because of too many students, and the Zoning Board would intervene.



(CITY OF ALEXANDRIA, CONT.)

Business License - 838-4680. A license is required, regardless of income. The \$30 minimum fee covers yearly income up to \$8570. The fee for the license when yearly income exceeds that amount is figured on the total gross income. The penalty fee for not having a license is figured on the gross receipts of the last three years plus the present year.

Property Tax Penalty - 838-4570. This is figured on any equipment or furniture declared as a business deduction.

Building Department - 838-4360. There is no Occupancy Permit required in Alexandria if the students are taught on an individual basis. They were vague if one was needed if group lessons or classes were taught.

CITY OF FALLS CHURCH

Zoning Laws - 241-5015. This is a subjective decision in Falls Church. The teacher must apply for an Occupancy Permit through the Public Works Department- 241-5080, at a cost of \$30. They would state the number of students that they will be teaching, the hours that they will be teaching, and other pertinant information, after which a decision will be made.

Business License - 241-5065. All teachers, regardless of income, are required to have a license. A fee of \$30 will be charged to teachers whose income is less than \$8330. The fee for teachers with annual gross receipts above that amount will be based on that income. A late fee for teachers who do not have a license is based on the gross receipts of the last three years plus the present year. There is also a property tax penalty on any furniture declared as a business deduction.

CITY OF VIENNA

Town Hall - 938-8000. Ask for Zoning or Business License. Zoning Laws- Lessons may be taught by appointment only. No noise may be generated through aby joint walls. An Occupancy Permit is required, at a cost of \$25. There is no problem if the business is in a single family home, but Vienna has gotten stricter on granting Occupancy Permits to teachers in townhouses because of recent complaints.

Business License - All teachers need a license, regardless of income. The fee is \$10 for annual income less than \$4545 and is adjusted based on gross receipts for income exceeding that amount. A penalty is imposed on teachers who do not have a lisence, based on their gross receipts of the last three years plus the present year. A penalty is also imposed for late property taxes.

ANNANDALE, RESTON, & SPRINGFIELD all are within Fairfax County and follow the county rules.

These Zoning law and business license regulations were compiled by Beth Gigante. Each NVMTA memben was unged to secure a basiness licence.



She also studied at the Mozarteum in Salzburg, Austria, and held a fellowship at the Berk-Music Center in shire Tanglewood in 1968.


Mrs. Stevens had taught at the New England Conservatory extension division, as well as at several other conservatories, colleges and universities.
