Meeting of the Board of Directors is called for Wednesday, April 27th, following the Board Dinner. Please notify recording secretary, Mrs. R. Lynn Fleenor, 108 Lowry Lane, Bristol, Tennessee if you are unable to attend.

Official Opening of the Forty-fifth Annual Convention is called for Thursday, April 28, 10:30 A.M. in Convention Rooms, lower level of the Marriott Hotel.

Inclosed credential forms for delegates, alternate and other voting members to be filled in and signed by President and Recording Secretary of the club represented by the delegate or alternate named thereon, and mailed to Mrs. E. K. Chambers, Box 62, Bluefield, West Virginia, at least one week prior to convention. Response obligatory.

ARTICLE II - VOTING BODY - Section I. The voting body of the State Convention shall consist of the Officers, Board of Directors; District Directors; Chairman of Departments and of Standing and Special Committees; Special and Life Members; Presidents of Associated State Organizations or their duly elected alternates; the President of every actively federated Senior organization or her elected alternate; one duly elected delegate and one duly elected alternate for every actively federated Senior organization of twenty members or less, and one duly elected alternate for every additional fifty members, provided the representation from any organization shall not exceed five duly elected delegates or duly elected alternates; one duly elected delegate from each actively federated Junior organization. Section II. Only delegates from active organizations whose dues are paid in full shall be accredited delegates at any call meeting of the Federation. Section III. Only individual members (special artists, composers, life, subscriber, donor, patron, contributing) whose dues are paid in full for the current year shall be qualified.

JAMES JOLLY PLAYS PIANO RECITAL HERE

James Jolly, pianist, who played at Carnegit Recital Hall last night, has a big, warm tone and a grand approach to his instrument.

He was at his best in energetic, powerful moments. In the Chopin-Liszt Chant Polonais No. 5, in the Chopin B flat minor scherzo, in Franck's Prelude, Chorale and Fugue, the louder passages were dashing and convincing.

But Mr. Jolly was a little too ready to be forceful at the expense of subtlety. And in quieter places, he consistently slowed down tempos at the ends of phrases, spilling impetus. A Bach Prelude and Fugue in D suffered from this treatment, as did much of the Beethoven Sonata in A Flat (Op. 26).

Two excerpts from Albéniz's "Iberia" were not always clear in detail, and at times in one of the Liszt "Sonetti del Petrarca" has right hand sounded harsh and pounding.

The Fugue of the Franck made clear—what one had suspected before—that some of the young pianist's interpretative unevenness came from nervousness. Judging by the critical reception of his two former concerts here, one concludes that he had an off night last night.

Alma Grayce Miller, 71, musician, composer and choir director, died Monday in Arlington Hospital.

A resident of 4014 Lorcum Lane, Arlington, Miss Miller composed "The Giant Scissors" for the Arlington Civic Symphony and had other works performed by the Buffalo and New

York symphonies.

She was born in Meadville, Pa., and was graduated from the Pennsylvania College of Music. Miss Miller took postgraduate courses on a scholarship at the Eastman School, Cornell University and the Chicago Conservatory of Music, where she obtained her degree in composition.


